A word from...

Many of you will have attended our 19th biennial ISSR meeting in Cork, Ireland in July and I want to begin with an enormous thank you to the local organising committee for all their hard work, which ensured this was such a success. Notably 188 people registered for the meeting coming from 25 different countries and as far away as New Zealand. There were 84 poster presentations and 14 symposia all of which were incredibly informative and topical, although some ran on Irish time. The three plenary lectures were superb quality and the social programme ensured our usual convivial but vital scientific interactions occurred throughout the meeting. Behind-the-scenes several members of Council and the LOC raised financial support from 17 sponsors enabling the Society to run the meeting on budget while also providing attendance support for 14 pioneers and prodigies (postgraduates and post-docs) to give excellent talks (see the award photo later). Notes from the post-meeting survey are also included in this Newsletter, from which it is clear that the event delivered high quality science and opportunities of social interaction between members that the ISSR strives to maintain. While at the meeting we ran a short Council meeting (picture in this newsletter) to address any issues and in particular discuss potential venues and organisers for future meetings. I am delighted to say that we have a firm offer from Harald Sitte for the 2022 meeting to be held in Vienna and the survey clearly supports this as a favoured option. For the 2020 meeting Council has discussed a number of options but the survey showed there was no clear favourite. However, we are very excited about a recent offer to hold the meeting in Cancun and will inform you of the choice in the near future.

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The Cork meeting ended with a conference dinner in 'The Vertigo at Cork County Hall' where all our recognized trainees received their awards. The Society has one additional award, Honorary Lifetime Membership, which it can confer to a member in recognition of the contribution that the recipient has made to research in the field and the Society. It was also my honour to make this award to Daniel Hoyer at the closing ceremony and this newsletter contains a short article explaining why.

For some years Richard Green (Secretary/Treasurer, 1996-2003 and President 1994-6) has been the guardian of a variety of historical society documents. These include details of the formation of the Society, early membership lists, the first 80 newsletters, previous meeting and abstract books, and short research biographies 'Serotonin Notes' that were written by famous serotonologists of the time, none of which are available in electronic form. We have managed to persuade the Welcome Trust to act as a safe repository for these documents in their 'Welcome Collection'. Hopefully in time this material might become digitised and available to anyone interested.

It is with great sadness that we have heard that John Fozard passed away on Friday 28 September, 2018 following a long illness. John was an active member of the 'Serotonin Club', being present at the inaugural meeting in Heron Island, a past member of Council, and joint organiser for the Serotonin Club meeting in Basel, 1990. His research work was pivotal to understanding the basic pharmacology of 5-HT1A, 5-

HT3 and 5-HT4 receptors in particular. He was a wonderful man, excellent mentor and great friend of many of our members and he will be sadly missed.

It has been an enormous pleasure and privilege to serve as President for my favourite society. Working with the small but harmonious team of Officers has been a delight. In particular, I want to thank Lyn Daws who has worked tirelessly for the benefit of the Society and will be leaving her position in January. I also owe enormous gratitude to Kelly Berg Treasurer/Secretary) without whom I don't believe this role would be feasible. It was a delight to present her with a token of our appreciation at the conference dinner reception (see photo later). I will pass on the post of President to Anne Andrews in January and know you will give her the full support that I have received.

Daniel Hoyer ISSR Honorary Lifetime Member

During the final closing ceremony at Cork it was my great pleasure to award Daniel Hoyer an Honorary Lifetime Membership. The award is conferred in recognition of the contribution that the recipient has made to research in the field and the Society. Danny of course has done both in large measures. His seminal work has culminated in the current classification of serotonin receptors based on structure, function and signal transduction. His early work with radioligands identified the presynaptic location of 5-HT1B receptors and the discovery of what was then called the 5-HT1C receptor. He was also involved in the development of several selective 5-HT receptor agonists and antagonists that greatly advanced understanding of their functional role. His work moved into somatostatin, receptors and function but he never forgot his roots. In addition to his research on 5-HT he has shown enormous and continuous commitment to our society, serving as an officer and becoming President in 2002. He was also the recipient of the Rapport Plenary Award in Seattle in 2016.

Danny holds the Chair of Pharmacology & Head of the Department of Pharmacology and Therapeutics, Faculty of Medicine, Dentistry and Health Sciences, University of Melbourne where he moved to in 2012. He obtained a PhD and DSc in Strasbourg before undertaking post-doctoral research at the University of Pennsylvania. He moved into cardiovascular research at Sandoz in 1983 before seeing the light and moving into the CNS division in 1989 and then on to Novartis. Danny has published over 340 papers that have received nearly 27,500 citations and has an h-index of 83. He has served at the scientific council of Institut Pasteur and on the Council and a Director of the British Pharmacological Society. He is currently a senior editor of Psychopharmacology, Naunyn Schmiedeberg's Archives of Pharmacology, Encyclopedia Psychopharmacology and British Journal of Pharmacology. He has chaired the somatostatin and 5-HT receptor subcommittees of IUPHAR nomenclature committee and been President of the European Neuropeptide Club.

Given this resume I know you will agree with me that there could be no more deserved recipient of the Honorary Lifetime Membership award, in recognition of his contribution to The Society and the neurotransmitter. Despite all this the event nearly didn't happen, as Danny was completely unaware of it and may not have attended the meeting. We owe great thanks to Laura Jacobson both for convincing Danny to attend as usual, and keeping 'the secret'. It is not often that Danny is stuck for words! Congratulations from us all.

ISSR Meeting Cork 2018 Mentors and Networking

Serotonin on the Wild Atlantic Way was a wonderful meeting full of networking events and groundbreaking science. One of my favorite moments was hearing Dr. Patricia Gaspar's plenary lecture, and references to her beloved French soccer team (who were playing for the World Cup during her lecture). Then afterward, everyone gathered in the nearby pub to watch the second half, and France win the World Cup! This was the first of many unifying moments during the conference. The opening reception followed in the beautiful Aula Maxima, and the first evening ended with an Irish style networking event for we trainees. UCC Young Scientists took us on a pub-crawl around Cork to five pubs, and I am delighted to report that I made it to all of them! Early the next morning was the Travel Award breakfast at the River Lee Hotel. Despite the pub-crawl the night before, I was there bright and early to network with other trainees as well as our designated mentors. Throughout the meeting, these assigned mentors helped the travel awardees network, provided feedback on their research, and gave valuable advice and insights into potential career paths. Next was my favorite symposia (though I could be biased), led by Drs. Harald Sitte and Lynette Daws, that discussed novel contributions of SERT and organic cation transporters (OCTs) to psychostimulant abuse. Lunch that day consisted of a trip to Blarney Castle. We had a lovely drive through the countryside and were able to explore the grounds surrounding the castle, including an incredible poison garden showcasing plants that are poisonous yet were once used for medicinal purposes. Dinner was on our own that evening and I accompanied Dr. Daws to dinner along with other meeting attendees from six different labs in three different countries. I had the privilege of sitting next to Drs. Daniel Hoyer and Laura Jacobson. Aside from discussing the importance of translational sciences (the proof is in the pudding, as Dr. Hoyer says!), I also had the pleasure of getting to know them and hearing about their time in France. It was inspiring to talk to such esteemed scientists. A highlight from the third day was the symposia led by Drs. Beate Niesler and Nicholas Barnes. It was interesting to learn about serotonin's role in gastrointestinal disorders however, the most invigorating part of the symposia were the photos joking about explosive diarrhea. Never again will I think about gastrointestinal disorders the same way! The third evening was another Irish style networking event at the Franciscan Well Brewery complete with a tour of the brewery. Again, this offered another opportunity to network with fellow serotoninologists, and to drink Irish-made beer of course. The final day consisted of multiple talks regarding serotonin's role in plasticity. My favorite talk was from Dr. Massimo Paqualetti. This event was bittersweet to me, since it was the close of the meeting and time to say goodbye to old and new friends and colleagues. 
